

Students and Staff Differ on New Attendance Policy

"That's weak!" commented senior, Andre Wren when told of the new attendance policy that includes a penalty of detention for a student having no excuse returning to school.

The new requirements for being absent are having a parent call in on the day of the absence, the day of return, or bring a note the day of return. If these requirements are not met, detention that night or the next day must be served by the student after school for an hour. If the excuse is forgotten, one day is permitted for the student to provide an excuse before having to serve detention. Absence from detention will result in suspension from school. "We would prefer to have the excuse before hand because it saves both the parents and us a lot of trouble," said Matson.

Matson, Pasco High's vice principal, explained that the new policy creates a less confusing system for all students, parents, and the attendance staff. The attendance office staff would prefer that all excuses be called in either the day of the absence or the day returning to school. Call in excuses by parents keep the attendance office from having long lines of students along with several easy to lose and hard to record excuses.

Matson hopes that the new policy will keep students in class rather than being truant. "Our students are sent to school to learn and they can not learn unless they are in class. The idea of this new policy came from Richland High School and basically other schools who have had the same type of system. We are just deciding to try their idea," commented Matson.

Mr. Gross, one of Pasco High's mathmatics instructors feels the new attendance policy will be an advantage to our school. "The new policy will make students more responsible and they will learn that regular attendance at school is important.

Most students think that the policy is too strict, but by taking into consideration the hassles of late excuses and unexcused absences, most believe some punishment is just. However, an hour after school is considered to be too much.

"In my opinion, the policy is too strict. Having to go to detention for one hour because of an unexcused absence is dumb," said sophomore, Jamie Gier when first told of the new policy.

The fact that some families have a busy schedule makes it difficult for some students to receive an excuse from their parents in a timely manner. Thus, they do the time even though they didn't do the crime. Innocence until proven guilty is the heart of our justice system, however, because of the "detention or suspension" sentence, this system makes you guilty until proven innocent. In cases where students are truant this system is acceptable, but some students would be punished even with a legitimate excuse.




MR. WRIGHT



"I believe that we can beat anyone in the league, but I also believe that anyone can beat us."



that they learned about while attending classes. Pasco received the leadership pennant 2 out of 3 times.






Bulldogs score another touchdown against North Central (above)






