EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES- ARE THEY REALLY EQUAL?

Many students at Pasco High resent activities like celebrating Black History Month and Cinco de Mayo or clubs like Mecha and African American Student Union. Some think it's unfair to have clubs for minorities and none for "whites."

It would probably be a rather controversial scandal to have an "all-white" club or "white day" at Pasco High. People would be outraged and call it racist. So why then aren't minority clubs and events racist?

Well, for one, these activities are not restricted just to the minority they focus on. Anyone can walk into a Mecha meeting and most of the school attends the Black History Month assembly. No one is being shut out, it all depends on your individual will and interests.

It is difficult to truly understand the need for affirmative action (any program that promotes the recognition and employment of minorities and women) unless you are a woman or a minority. But, before we get into that, what is a minority?

In the U.S., a minority is basically a group or community that differs in race, religion, national origin or gender from the majority of the general population.

Around twenty years ago, affirmative action was started to combat discrimination aimed towards minorities. Many programs and associations have formed to help support this cause.

It is a deeply disputable subject because it has brought about changes in our nation and naturally, the majority (white males) didn't like that.

Should more women be placed in construction jobs even if they can't lift as much as men and should there be scholarships for solely minority students?

What most people do not realize is that affirmative action has not completely flipped over the nation or even gotten close to equalizing discrimination.

It's not as if white males have been given a cold shoulder and can't get into college or get jobs anymore. It's just that now they have a little added competition.

One way to look at it is with a pendulum, one side is the "white" side and the other is the minority side. For most of, let's say, the existence of the U.S., the dial on the pendulum has been firmly fixed on the white side.

A few decades ago when women were granted the right to vote and minorities were allowed to exercise their God-given rights (i.e. The Civil Rights Movement) the dial slowly moved just a tad bit over to the minority side, just a tad.

Now, with more minorities having new opportunities, such as a better chance of going to college, the dial is moving closer and closer to the minority side. But, the idea is not to get it all the way to the minority side, just to the middle. That would be equality. One can almost be certain that our generation will not see the pendulum in a symmetrical stance.

So, before all you non-minority types go off ranting and raving over the unfairness of affirmative action, think about a few things (1) have you ever felt deprived of anything reasonable because of your gender or color of your skin? (2) has your race ever been enslaved for two-hundred years or unethically been kicked off its land? And (3) a few scholarships and a couple reserved for "minorities only" jobs will never make up for centuries of barbaric and condescending behavior.

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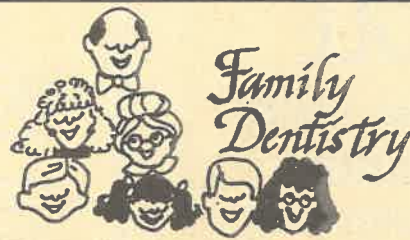
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NEW YEARS RESOLUTIONS-

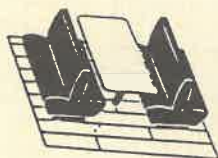

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LIFE AT A PRIVATE SCHOOL- A WHOLE DIFFERENT WORLD

Have you ever wondered what life would be like if you went to a private school or an all guys or girls school? If you like me, you've been in public school ever since kindergarten. Life in a private school is much different. It was amazing to find out how their classes are ran, their rules enforced, and about their sport seasons.

Some of you may have heard of the private school right here in Pasco called Riverview Baptist. On the other hand, the name might not be familiar because there are only approximately one hundred and forty students, and that's counting grades kindergarten through twelfth! Wow! you think to yourself. Our high school alone, ninth through twelfth, has around 2200 students. They only use 8 classrooms to teach those one hundred and forty students.

Hey guys, you think tucking in your shirts is a pain? Try having to wear collared shirts everyday without jeans. Jeans are not allowed for either guys or girls at Riverview Baptist. Guys have to wear slacks or black pants with belts. The dress code for girls is skirts below the knee and blouses. No T-shirts or low cut shirts.

The students at Riverview Baptist receive their education mainly through little packets called paces. They vary between twenty-five and sixty pages. You basically work on your own through the paces, but if u have a question there are instructors there to help you. To pass the pace, you have to take quizzes and pass a test at the end. There are classes like accounting and chemistry that have teachers that teach the class without paces.

They have to take P.E. all through high school, because they only have it two days a week, and they never have to run the mile. Their P.E. classes are same sex only. The guys and the girls are split up into two different classes.

Matthew Burkhead, a senior at Riverview Baptist, has been through both public and private schooling. He went to a private school Kindergarten through third, public school fourth through seventh, and back to private schooling eighth through twelfth. The one thing Matt doesn't like about private schools is their sport system. Riverview Baptist only offers Basketball and Soccer for guys and just Volleyball for girls. The guys bas-

ketball team, which Matt belongs to, practices twice a week with games usually on Friday. They have to travel everywhere around Washington for their games, because they only play other small church schools. They will usually leave around 6 am to head to Seattle, play a game when they get there, travel to another town and play another game that night. Two games in one day, plus traveling! Their uniforms are long, baggy shorts with normal shirts. Girls volleyball on the otherhand where long culottes that go to their knees and a regular volleyball T-shirts.

Their discipline policy is much different from ours. If their talking, chewing gum, tardy, or show disrespect, they get demerits. Demerits??? What are those? They are sentences given to they student that they have to copy, usually around three hundred times! If they're caught fighting, they receive hacks!

Matt feels that they try to prepare you better for college. "There's a better student teacher relationship, because they work with you more one on one."

Oliver Alquist is a senior at an all guys private Catholic high school in Seattle, called O'Dea. He has always went to a private school, kindergarten through twelfth. Kindergarten through 8th was co-ed and ninth through twelfth is the same sex.

O'Dea is very similar to Pasco High in their education and sports system. They offer basically the same classes, except they only have honors classes instead of advanced placement or college prep. They offer baseball, basketball, tennis, football, track, cross country, soccer, swimming, golf, and wrestling. Oliver himself only plays baseball for O'Dea, but plays basketball for a neighborhood team.

There are 110 students in his class, and about 460 in the school. With about 24 staff members. He goes to school a half and hour less than us everyday! His classes start at 8:30 and end at 2:20. They have a half an hour lunch just like us, but only the juniors and seniors have the choice of leaving campus. The Freshman and Sophomores have on campus lunch.

There is basically no set discipline policy, but there are the normal school rules such as nothing is allowed in the school that can be seen as being harmful to a student, such as drugs, alcohol, and/or weapons. If they have too many tardy's or their shirt is untucked they can get detention.

Oliver says that "the only advantage to going to an all guys school to me, is that I see people there able to act like themselves more than they could outside of the all male atmosphere. There is also the ability to focus on the schooling in classes," rather than the girls.

Going to a private school may not be all that bad. You could make closer friends and know your whole class better, since there are fewer students. There is also the advantage of a lower student/teacher ratio. The main disadvantages that I could see, if the possibility of not having all the same opportunities in sports as we do here at Pasco High, and the fact that we can wear jeans.

The wrestling team has been doing great so far this year. They have already had a few matches and tournaments but the future will be the real challenge since they will be so busy.

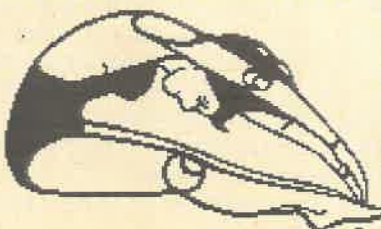

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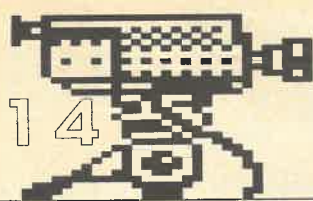

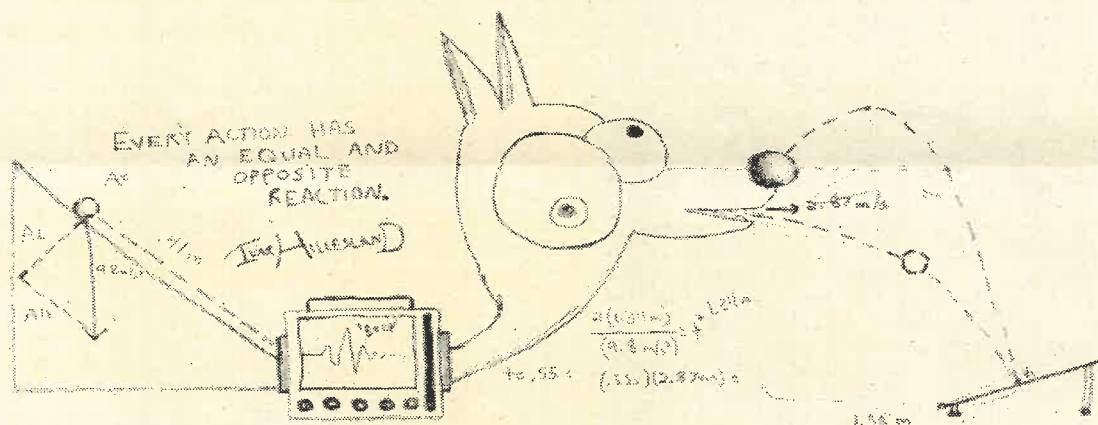
