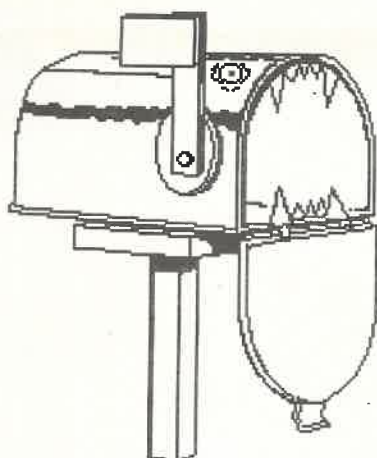

Biology Camping with a T.V.

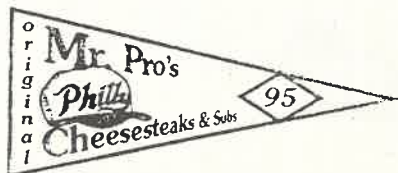

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Pasco's New Schools

This past summer construction crews were busy building three elementary schools for our district. Robert Frost and Emerson were both replaced while Whittier was built to ease overcrowding. These new schools have educators excited about the students' futures.

The new schools are equipped with technology to help students and teachers use more resources than the book. Every classroom has a TV and a VCR, a computer, and the ability to connect 12-15 more computers to the internet. Each school is being set up with a computer lab with 30 computers. The library has 12 computers for student use. Although it is not in use the schools are wired for video conferencing.

Mr. David Prado, the principal at Robert Frost, said that the building is designed to allow the teachers to work together with their classes. The teachers lounge accommodates the needs of the teacher not only for a break but to also work to prepare for class. Prado is excited to see the math testing scores jump from 2% to 19.6% in only one year and can't wait to see this year's scores.

The construction isn't quite finished at all the schools. Buildings for head start at Whittier and Robert Frost are nearing completion, and the playground at Robert Frost is still a few weeks from being completed.

The biggest problem seems to be getting used to the building, educators don't mind a bit. Cathy Osborn, principal at Whittier, wants to thank the community for passing the bond to make it all possible.

Elections '98

Election Day 1998 was Tuesday Nov. 3. This year, thousands of voters had the following issues to decide upon:

State Initiatives:

Initiative 688: This measure would increase minimum wage to \$5.70 in 1999 and \$6.50 in 2000. Also, minimum wage would rise along with inflation. Supporters say it is fair and just because and adult working at the current minimum wage of \$4.90 is living 30% under the poverty level. Opponents fear that prices will rise significantly and a sudden change in the economy could be dangerous.

Initiative 692: This proposes to legalize medical marijuana for terminally ill patients with diseases such as cancer, AIDS and glaucoma. Doctors would be allowed to prescribe smoking marijuana to their patients who would be allowed to grow it. Critics feel that the wording of this initiative is too vague and most patients would end up buying marijuana from illegal sources. Others say that the purpose of the measure is to help the sick, not increase drug abuse.

Initiative 694: This measure would ban partial birth abortions. This means that if a woman's cervix is dilated, water has broken and the baby is in the birth canal, then it's too late for an abortion. Supporters agree that a child should not be aborted if it is half born. However, critics fear that because of the wording, other types of abortions could also be banned.

Initiative 200: This initiative would end of government affirmative action programs that are "discriminatory" and "preferential." The idea stems from the debate about whether affirmative action helps minorities and women have more opportunities or if it discriminates against white males. Critics believe it would regress affirmative action and that the wording is confusing. Supporters say affirmative action is unfair and should be ended.

Referendum 49: This law would approve unding state highway improvements and lower the cost of car license tabs by \$30 per car. The creators of this measure propose that the money collected from license tabs should be used for transportation costs only. Currently, about half of that money funds other government projects such as education. Opponents say it is a short term fix that could cause a much larger, long term problem.

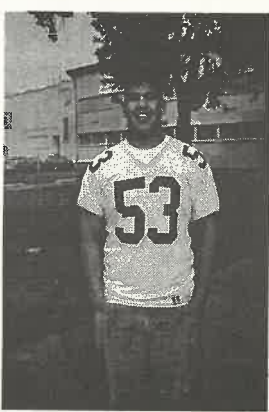

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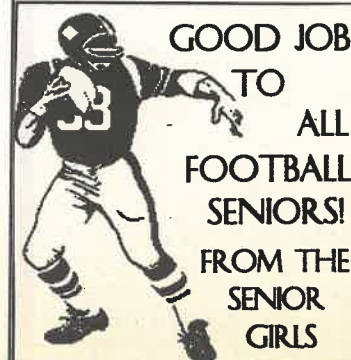

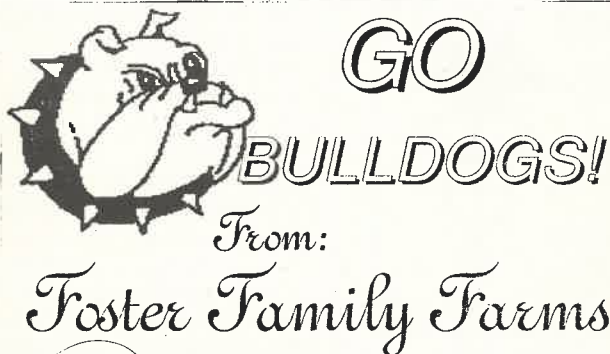
The Third Eye Blind Concert at the coliseum was one of the best things to hit the Tri-Cities in ages. The people were lively, the music loud, and the effects awesome.

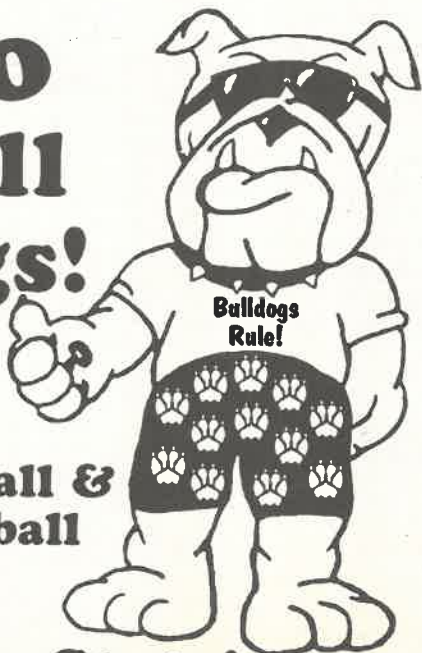

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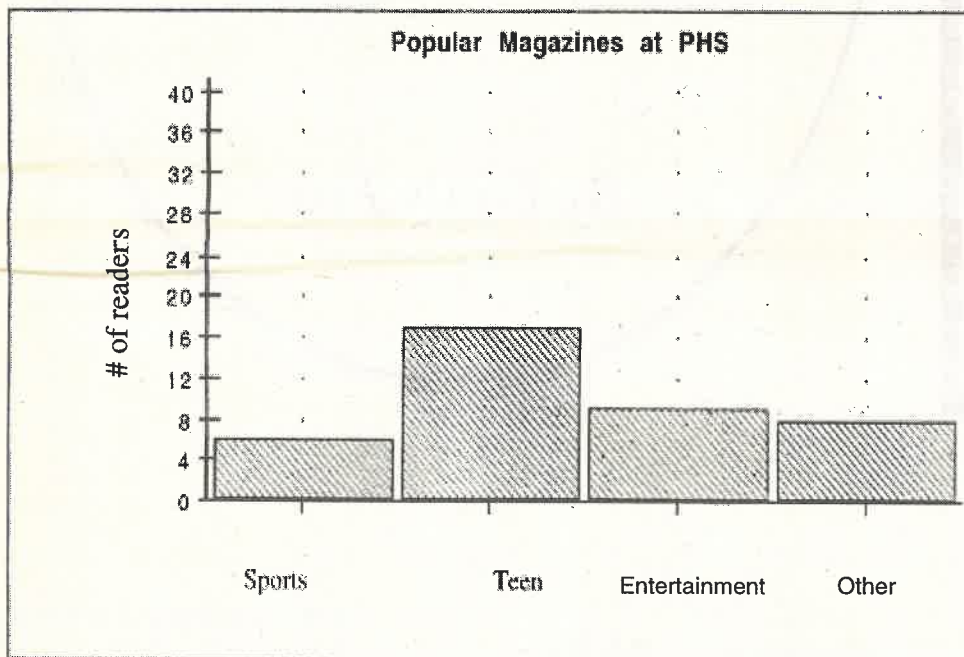

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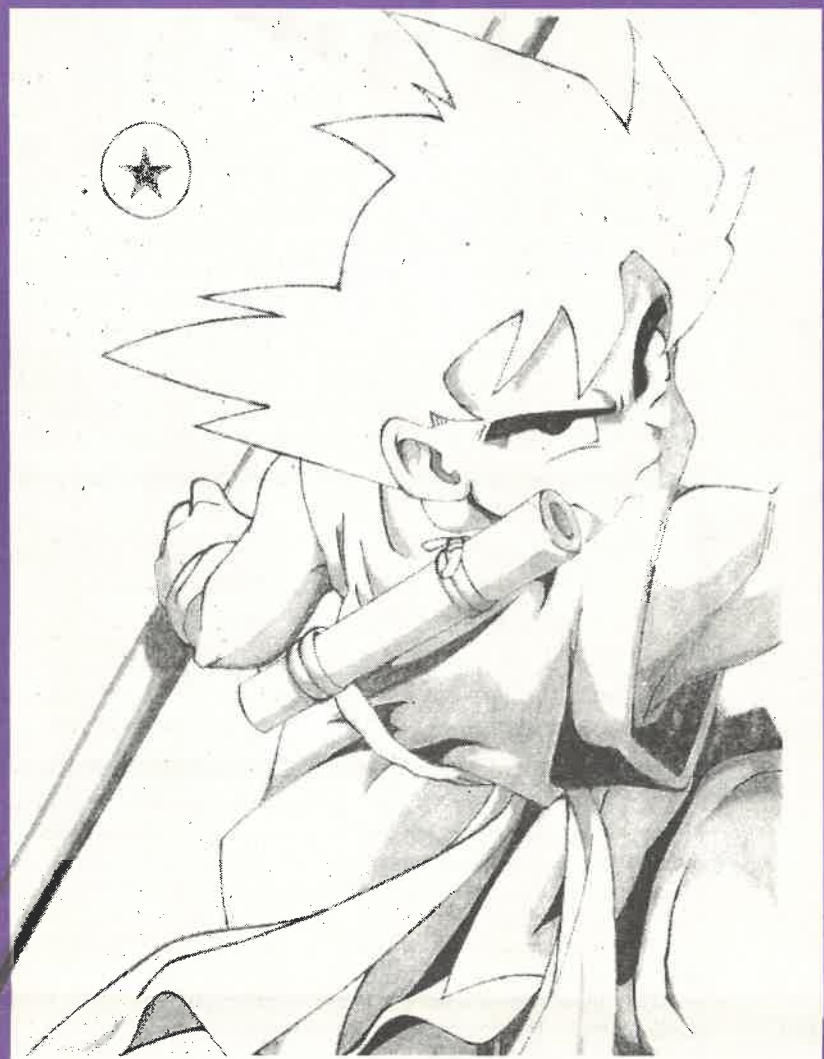
