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Hold Homemakers Conference

The Future Homemakers of America Leadership Conference is held each fall to prepare each club's newly elected officers for their duties and responsibilities during the coming school year. The date and location is determined by a majority vote of the entire region. It was decided to hold the meeting Thursday, September 17 from 3:00 to 6:30 at Pasco High School.

There will be approximately 190 officers coming from Region V, which extends from Cle Elum to Quincy. This is the largest region in Washington. A pre-planning meeting was held September 3, 1959 to establish the program of the meeting. The organization offices are: president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, historian, reporter, songleader, members and advisors. After the discussion groups are adjourned, a general assembly is held for evaluation reports.

Honors Classes Added At Pasco High

Honor classes in science and English have been added to the Pasco High School curriculum for the coming year. Spanish will be added to the language courses.

"The honor classes are basically for A and B students," explained High School Principal Emerson Morgan. "We are trying to let those who want to move faster to do so."

Morgan said the honor class in chemistry will allow the better students to go "further and faster" in the study of the science than the general chemistry class. By making a second year of biology available, students more interested in the living sciences can gain more instruction, Morgan explained. Usually the basic biology classes are so large they must be designed for the average student.

He said the fourth year of English will have two groupings. One will be a college preparatory course. The other will add further instruction for those who do plan to attend college, but want more instruction in this field.

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Bulldogs Scrimmaged Saturday

The Pasco Bulldogs, working under the watchful eye of Coach Bill Mayberry, hustled through 90 - minutes of scrimmage play Saturday morning at Edgar Brown Stadium.

Mayberry started an all-junior line with Don Evans at the quarterback position, Clark Henderson at left half, Ray Amstadt at fullback, and Ken Knievton, at right half.

Evans, the Bulldogs No. 1 quarterback, is being hard pressed by Clark Romans, a hard running junior.

Henderson, returning for his final year of high school sports, hopes to better his already outstanding scoring record. He now holds the fourth highest position in the Big Seven Conference in points, yardage gained, and rushing.

Ray Amstadt, an old veteran of the Bulldog grid team scored 57 points on seven touchdowns and 15 extra points last fall while gaining 455 yards rushing. Amstadt is expected to start at the full-back position in this Friday's game with Pendleton.

The Saturday lineup for the red team was Tom Andrews at left end, Ed Triebwasser at left tackle, Jim Yarnell in the center position, Greg Arbogast at left guard, Tom Brandon, right guard, Keith Snider at right tackle, and Alan Hoover on right end.

Don Evans was quarterback for the reds, assisted by left half Clark Henderson, full-back Ray Amstadt, and right half Ken Knievton.

The white team was headed by quarterback Romans, with Bob Mooney and Shelby Tate holding down the right and left half positions respectively. Tim Emmons, a promising new sophomore did well as fullback. On the line was Jim Keane at left end, Skip Butler at left tackle, Dale Minike at center, Ron and Randy Schultz guarded at left and right, and Jim Morrison right tackle. Mel Owens did a good job at right end, and will probably be a starter tonight.

Sophomores Pete Hansen, Bill Keller, and Pat McNeal also made a good showing in the Saturday practice and may develop into top notch players before the season ends.

The Bulldog coaches scouted the Pendleton-Milton Free-water game last Friday which ended in an easy 31-13 victory for the Buckaroos. Pendleton proved to have a fast and heavy backfield with returning lettermen like Ray Sharrah, Chuck Eliason, Jerry Cronin, Dennis Tyler and Jim Potter.

The Bucks, hampered by a relatively light line, should be a good match for the Bulldogs in tonight's game.

Pasco's coaches are very optimistic about this year's season. The team has shown great spirit.

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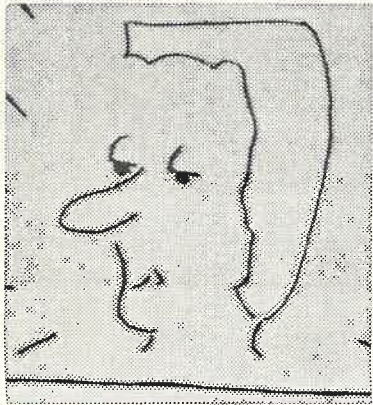
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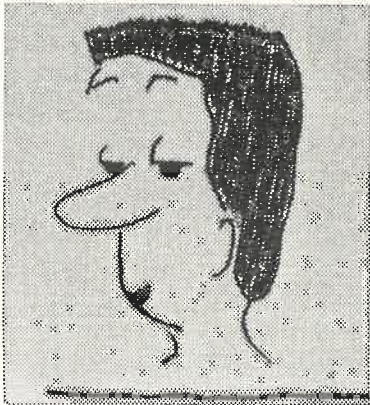
Sophomore Shake, Seniors Boast

Advice To Sophomores

Ah, yes, school has begun and as always sophomores must somehow learn the rules and regulations of high school!
