The only T.D. of the afternoon came in the third period of play when Walla Walla broke through the left tackle and went for a 45-yard touchdown run.

The Bullpups, working under coach Russ Wiseman, played in two seperate teams, the offensive team included Luther James and Dave Blevens at ends, Jim Chubb and Roy Linders at tackle, Loren Larson and Clark Romans trading off at the quarterback position, and Roy Avery and Bob Cleveland holding down the left and right halfback spots respectively. Tim Emmons and Rudy Terrin took turns in the fullback position, while Pat Horsley and Mike Phillips guarded. Doyle Clapper was the center for the offensive team. Dave Whitmire went in for James in the first quarter.

Enthusiasm! A remarkable word! The ancient Greeks used it to describe an inspired person. The enthusiastic person, they thought, was one who reflected the presence of an indwelling god. And the more you ponder this, the more convinced you become that the Greeks, as usual, not only had a word for it, but the right word.

What, exactly is it? I would define it as the ability to react with eagerness. The enthusiastic person has the capacity of generating excitement about ideas, people, events, anything. He feels things. He cares. And as he cares, he is alive — just as when you stop caring altogether you are dead.

Where does it come from, this power, this capacity to react with gladness? I suspect that it is built into all of us, that each of us starts out in life with an adequate supply. Most young things, from colts to kittens, seem to be handsomely endowed with The problem is how to retain it once the freshness and eagerness of youth are past.

Certain inevitable aspects of living seem to be the enemy of enthusiasm. Routine deadens it, familiarity dulls it.

From my window, as I write this, I can see a disdainful cat walking along the top of a fence. Just a plain alley-cat, nothing to be excited about. But suppose I had never seen a cat before. Suppose this incredibly graceful creature was the ONLY cat in existence. Imagine, then, the excitement he would cause, the price he would command!

Each of us as SOME spark of enthusiasm! Some of us let it grow dim under the dust of daily living. Some of us, like the man in the parable of the talents, hoard it jealously, bury it for safekeeping deep within ourselves. This is a mistake. Enthusiasm needs to be expressed. People who give free rein to their enthusiasm will never run short of it, for by so doing they are constantly adding to their supply.

Enthusiasm: The greatest gift in the world! But to keep it, you have to give it away.

Look around you, watch your classmates and see how many of them REALLY possess enthusiasm or (as we often say) instead: Class Spirit.

How many of them seem always to be doing something for the good of the school? How many are always encouraging others around them to be enthusiastic with the use of their own enthusiasm? Look around you—it's a quality that can be spotted in a

too much for the Pasco team, trying for their first win of the season. However, they found out early in the game that the Pasco Bulldogs were not an easy team to beat.

Richland held the lead through most of the game, scoring the first T.D. in the beginning quarter.

Steve Smith managed to block Richland's punt attempt and tackle Tom Brandon recovered the ball, carrying it to the Richland 20 before being upset. After Ray Amstadt and Clark Henderson moved the ball to the half-yard line, Amstadt plunged over for the first Bulldog score. He also kicked for the conversion, giving the Bulldogs a 7-6 lead.

Richland returned Randy Schultz's kickoff 28 yards before being stopped. Working mostly from the ground, the managed a sneak from 3 yards out, again putting Richland in the lead. The conversion kick was blocked this time by Brad

With only 13 seconds left in the half, Richland picked up another T.D., bringing the half-time score to 18-7.

Pasco received the Bomber kickoff and returned the ball to the 30 yard line. Two plays later, Pasco end Alan Hoover snagged a 35-yard pass from Amstadt, behind Richland defenses, and ran the distance for another Bulldog touchdown. The extra point kick was no good.

With only a five point lead, the Bombers were forced into action, and with 3:51 left in the third period, managed to score a touchdown. Waltman scored the conversion run.

In the final period of the game, Pasco staged a sustained ground drive, with Amstadt sprinting 40 yards before being stopped. This put the ball on the Richland 1½ yard

Two plays later, Amstadt crashed over the Bomber defenses for the final T.D. of the game for the Bulldogs. booted conversion put the score at 25-20.

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
