With Baia Dora as a sort of "home base," they traveled to many interesting places, such as Rome, Milan and Tivoli, all in Italy. While Jerry was in Rome, she visited many famous sites. St. Peter's Cathedral, the Vatican, and the ancient part of Rome, where she viewed the Coliseum, are just a few. She also attended an opera, which she enjoyed very much.

The relatives with whom she stayed in Baia Dora had four children, all fourth cousins to Jerry. There were three boys, 22, 23, and 24 years old, and as Jerry described them, all were "living dolls," and one girl about 18. They could not resist teasing Jerry about drinking milk at her meals, since everyone else drank wine. They also told her that she spoke Italian just as if she had a bowl of mush in her mouth!

Some of the many impressive things about Italy, Jerry said, are the magnificent churches and fountains in every town. No matter how small the town is, there will always be a fountain in the square, and the churches are quite ornate. Some of the churches have altars made of gold or silver.

Jerry emphasized the fact that the Italian people were always friendly and helpful, and treated her quite royally during her stay in Italy.

She and her grandfather returned to New York by ship and from there traveled to Pasco by train. Jerry summed up her feelings about her trip with these few words. "I'm going back," she said very definitely, "because I just love it there."

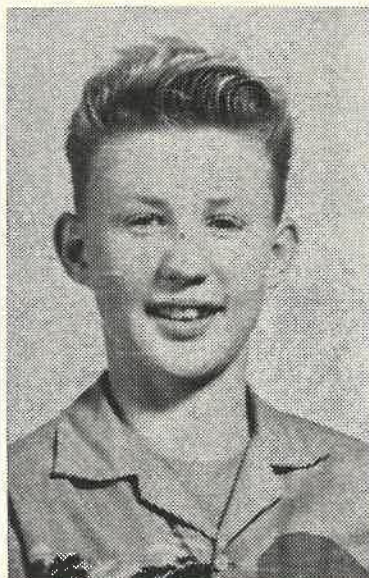

Bulldog Win Boosts Hopes

The Bulldogs of Pasco emerged from the football field with high hopes for the remainder of the season after whipping the Shelton High-climbers 26-0. The non-conference game played at Edgar Brown Memorial Stadium on October 16, was the first win for the Bulldogs this season, and Shelton's fifth straight loss.

Junior halfback **Bob Moon-ey** led the Bulldogs, scoring two T.D.'s in the first play of the second quarter, the fast halfback sprinted 80 yards, for a Bulldog score. Again in the last quarter, Mooney charged the Shelton defenses and broke away for a 15 yard touchdown run.

Pasco's first score came early in the game when **Clark Henderson** went 67 yards on a handoff from **Ray Amstadt**. Again in the last few minutes of the game, halfback **Ken Kniveton** intercepted a High-climber pass and **Shelby Tate** carried the pigskin 80 yards for the final score of the game. **Amstadt** scored two points in kicking for the conversion.

Henderson made a T.D. from the Shelton 26, but due to a clipping penalty the play was no good.

Bulldogs Rout Grizzlies

The Pasco Bulldogs making a big comeback after a slow-starting season, won for the second week in a row, in a 20-13 upset over the Grizzlies of Sunnyside.

The night game, played in Sunnyside on Oct. 23, was the first conference win for the Bulldogs, and Sunnysides fourth conference defeat.

Neither team managed to score in the first quarter, but Ray Amstadt opened scoring early in the second period by making a T.D. and conversion kikk, giving the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead. Sunnyside came right back after the kickoff with two ground-gaining passes, which put the Grizzlies on Pasco's five yard line.

A pass interference penalty against the Bulldogs placed the ball on the two yard line and Sunnyside broke through for a touchdown. A conversion failure left the Bulldogs in the lead 7-6.

Regaining possession again, the Bulldog line fought for a 70-yard gain and Clark Henderson charged over the line from five yards out for a second Bulldog score. Again Amstadt's conversion kick was good for a 14-6 halftime lead.

After halftime entertainment by the Sunnyside band, the Pasco Bulldogs returned

to the field with plenty of fight left. With the ball in Grizzly territory, Amstadt flipped a 30-yard pass to quarterback Don Evans which gave the Bulldogs a 14-point lead. Amstadt's kick was low.

With the clock nearly run out, Sunnyside managed to score from 12-yards out with a neatly executed screen pass. The Grizzlies' conversion was good and the final score was Pasco 20, Sunnyside 13.

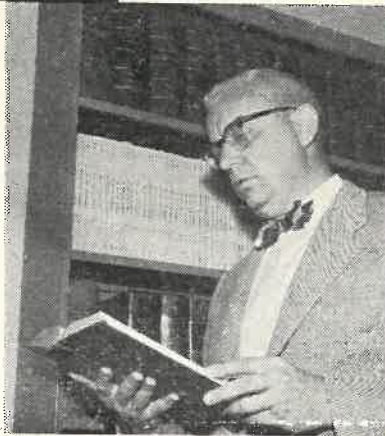
