This statement was made by Malcolm Muggeridge at a CBC lecture which he gave in the Pasco Senior High Auditorium last November 28. Mr. Muggeridge is known for his humorous articles in "Punch Magazine" and the "British Humor Magazine," an dis presently a traveling lecturer.

Mr. Muggeridge covered some of the in's and out's and up's and down's of humor in his lecture. He pointed out that comedians of today are up against two main difficulties: lack of material and ludicrous people. He went further to express his views on the "Disease of Solemnity" which has greatly affected the world and presented his plans to combat it.

He introduced his thoughts concerning a "laugh serum" which could be bought in a kit along with any other necessary equipment by the common people. This way the "Funny men of the stage" would no longer need to tear out their hair to make people laugh.

Mr. Muggeridge also spoke cleverly on the subject of "Telepolitics: the relationship between television and politics." While comparing our presidential campaigning to TV westerns he mentioned that Vice-President Nixon never really had a running chance because of his dark complexion and in all westerns the dark guy is always the bad guy.

Besides politics, he also discussed the culture and prestige of the U. S. and polls taken in foreign countries concerning these subjects. The meaning of humor was also made very clear to his audience.

I hope those who hold the keys to the solution of this problem will think hard about it and do something about it.

If we are losing ground to the Communists, as some say, perhaps it is because we cannot adequately express and explain the blessings of freedom and justice. If this is true, is it because English teachers also had too much to do when our parents were students?
