## Seniors Are Given GATB

Last week Mr. Hal Gislesen and Mr. Chuck LaRiviere gave the General Aptitude Test Battery to Pasco's Seniors. This examination is given throughout the United States and is sponsored by the Department of Labor in order to recognize and thus make better use of each individual's potential ability.

Some 80 seniors took part in the testing program which indicates that there are many who plan to work six months or more after the "61" graduation. The test amounts to a general intelligence survey and consists of vocabulary, numerical reasoning, spacial and form perception, motor coordination, and manual and finger dexterity. These tests are sent to Olympia where they are graded and returned, whereupon Mr. Gislesen discusses the results with the individual and eventually it is decided which field of work is most suitable for the applicant.

This testing method was begun in 1947 after World War II to assist returning service men in finding appropriate jobs. Presently it is used eliminate improper utilization of our country's youth and their capabilities.

## Bulldogs Bite Grizzlies

The Pasco Bulldogs have finally found the winning combination as they rolled over the Sunnyside Grizzlies 33-7. The Bulldogs led by quarterback Mel Louk scored the first time they got their hands on the ball. On the first play from scrimmage Mel Williams took a hand-off from Louk and spun away from three would be tacklers before being brought down after a 27 yard gain. Only eight plays later again it was Williams carrying and going over from the nine yard line for the first Pasco T.D. Mooney's kick was good.

Sunnyside then came back on a quarterback roll-out by sophomore Don Desmarais and went 58 yards before being caught from behind by Alan Hoover. Four plays later Pasco took over on downs on their own nineteen. The Bulldogs couldn't seem to get going and on the fourth down Whitmire went in to punt. He bobbled the pass from center and Sunnyside took over on the Pasco nineteen. Four plays later, Desmarais dove over from the two yard line for the only

Sunnyside score. The PAT was no good but Pasco's off-side gave Rick Thompson another chance and this time he made the conversion good.

Pasco again started on the move, but their drive was stopped when Amundson Jones intercepted one of Mel Louk's passes. He returned it to the 48 yard line before being stopped. The Sunnyside team started to roll but the Pasco defense held on the 25 yard line.

After Pasco had picked up two more first downs Jim Beard broke through temporarily for what seemed to be a good gain, but a fumble put the ball back in the hands of the aliens. Sunnyside then started a move of their own picking up two first downs before losing the ball on a fumble. From then on the Bulldogs dominated the game. The Pasco team started another drive on the 42 of Sunnyside and eight plays later fleet sophomore halfback Richard Jimmerson went over from the five to break the tie. Mooney again converted making it 14-7 for the Bulldogs at halftime.

The second half started off slowly, but Pasco's speed and stamina proved too much for Sunnyside.

The two teams exchanged punts and then the Pasco Bulldogs started again on the Grizzlie's 45. With Jimmerson and Williams doing most of the ball handling, moved down to the eight yard line where Jim Beard took the hand-off from Louk and went up the middle for another TD. Mooney's kick was no good.

The next time Pasco got the ball Louk fired a safety pass to Rich Jimmerson far behind the Sunnyside defenders for another TD. Mooney's kick was good.

Pasco's coach, Bill Mayberry, started sending in reserves and they seemed to feel the score was not high enough, and Bobby Cleveland ended a 58 yard drive by going over from the seven for the final score of the game. The conversion was no good.

The Bulldogs found several players that seemed to gain at will all through the game. Final score Pasco 33, Sunnyside 7.

## Jimerson Runs For Two TD's As Pasco Wins

Richard Jimmerson scored two touchdowns and set up another as he led the Pasco Bulldogs over Ellensburg. Pasco scored the first time they got their hands on the ball with Mel Williams and Jim Beard doing most of the carrying on a 74-yard drive and Mooney cracking over for the touchdown from nine yards out. Mel Louk also had runs of 32 and 38 yards, setting up the other two touchdowns. Jimmerson broke loose on the 22 yardline and went all the way for a Pasco score in the early part of the second quarter.

Jim Beard cracked over in the final quarter to end the scoring 23-13.
