



Alberto and Sergio Jackson: Our spanish visitors







part of my heart to each of them.' I thought your heart was mine,' she said.


It is, it is,' he pleaded. 'Everything that's left is yours."

offered through an outside agency, not the school. So when a student contacts this program it by passes the administrators and your name stays anonymous. Mr. Morgan


says, "It is a unique program possible. There is a number because the students names are anonymous." Kennewick

Governor Locke Touches on

School Safety

Governor Gary Locke graced Pasco High with his presence on Wednesday September 6, 2000 to discuss with school officials and students his education ideals for future years. Many community members were invited to



this special event as well as teachers, administrators, newspaper journalists, television crews, and approximately fifty students from all four grades combined. Due to Pasco High taking the initiative to make our school a safer place, the governor came to share more ideas, as well as listen to our administrators on what precautions have been taken. He also felt the need to listen to the student's outlook on how safe our halls really feel, and to inform us of steps one can take to help in the effort.

Students Ben Davis, Heather Hanson, Pascual, Cynthia Servantes, and Holly Mattson, along with Vice Principal Mr. Morgan, and Principal Mrs. Adkinson all greeted Governor Locke at the entrance to Pasco High, by the office. Very pleased to be welcomed to our school, Governor Locke warmly shook everyone's hands and inquired to the student's involvement with the school. Governor Locke proceeded to the timeout room so that he could become an honorary member of our school by receiving a badge.

Governor Locke strongly supports Pasco High, and the

decisions we have made to having a safer school. He agrees there is much importance in programs we offer such as third-party mediation, safe town, natural helpers, the tip line, having an in-school drug interventionist, etc... He stressed the fact that if we can feel safe in our classroom, then we will be able to focus on a better education. The one problem he finds with the tip line, or Safe Town, is that we spend a lot of money on these phone line opportunities, when we could spend that money on better educational opportunities. To fix this dilemma, he has proposed one "tip-line" for the entire state of Washington that would be completely government funded.

At the end of his speech, he allowed students to talk back to him, and was open to hearing student's comments and ideas. Gabe Gutierrez raised a question of elementary school testing standards, and questioned the Governor as to how fair he believes it is for Hispanic children to have to take the test in english. Governor Locke replied that he believes in higher educational standards regardless, but that if there is a problem with the test, the test needs to be changed. "We can't abandon our higher goal of a higher education though," he commented. Education is Governor Locke's number one priority for the school, as he has said numerous times, and he believes that everyone has the chance to, "work and study hard. You can pick your dream and achieve it.







DRAMA DEPARTMENT STILL LOOKING FOR DIRECTIONS

Theatrical production has long been a credit to the innovative and creative spirit of the Bulldogs. Recall last year's winter musical, Flapper, an impressive showcase of courageous PHS talent that packed the house both performances. For the past 30 years, PHS has produced two plays and one winter musical a year under the direction of Fred Fine. This fall, intro to drama and advanced drama students have been walking into classes taught by a substitute teacher and Mr. Brown. There has been no talk of the fall play, which is usually slated for production in November. What happened to drama at Pasco High? Obviously, an exhausted Mr. Fine retired,

but why hasn't anyone been hired to take his place?

In March of 2000, Mr. Fine submitted his retirement papers to the administration, along with a carefully compiled list of qualifications for a replacement drama instructor, quite a tall order. "Producing these plays is complicated. A theatre arts major is a master carpenter. They have to design sets. They also have to be an electrician and able to work with digital sound. If someone isn't trained in these areas it could be dangerous. They also have to be creative artist," commented Mr. Brown. On top of this, it is mandatory that the individual be able to work with and direct kids.

What about the fall play? "By now the play should have been chosen and bought," remarked Mr. Brown, "The advanced drama students should be prepping for the head stage/lighting/prop manager positions, and intro to drama students trained to work under them as crew." In fact, according to the course description for advanced drama, "The primary responsibility of this

class is production of plays." Currently, Mr. Brown's students are studying theater history and reading plays, a worthy endeavor to be sure, but of little use come show time.

What went wrong? In the opinion of Mr. Brown, "March would have been the ideal time to advertise a position requiring such credentials." The district requires that all drama teachers also have a language arts endorsement in order for drama classes fulfill an English elective. The job for a language arts teacher was posted in May, but for reasons unexplained, a drama background wasn't specified. "We posted again in July with the drama specification, still plenty of time to hire someone," commented Vice Principal Mike Guajardo. Among applicants, only one from Ohio appeared to be strongly qualified, and the job was offered to her in August. "She waited 10 days before rejecting the offer," said Mr. Guajardo, "and by that time it was too late to find someone qualified."

Dedicated thespians and playgoers fear not. Despite early obstacles, Pasco High theatre is not dead yet. Principal Sheri Adkinson assures, "We are hiring someone to come in just to work nights directing this year's plays. We're hoping to find someone with theater/arts background."

"Drama is an important program to Pasco High. We would never intentionally kill it," explained Mr. Guajardo.



guess. n: I think, kind of too, that it's peer pressure. I mean it's hard for me to go to school every day and to know that I am pretty much a loner when it comes to partying







only do our ladies have skills that are almost unmatchable by any other team in the big 9, but they also have the mental desire it takes to win. Last




