Davis Rolls Over Pasco

The Davis Pirates rolled to an easy 48-0 victory over the Pasco Bulldogs, Friday night. The Davis team seemed to be up for the game since the game before they took a 40-20 shellacking from the Wapato Wolves. The play that seemingly was the turning point of the game came on the opening kickoff when Les Ruckee took the kickoff and ran 92 yards for the first of many Davis touchdowns. Vern Henderson then went 27 yards off tackle for the second Davis touchdown. Blankenbaker, the explosive fullback of the Pirates seemed to run the Bulldogs ragged as he is a hard man to bring down. Early in the second quarter he broke away for 36 yards bringing the ball down to the Pasco eight yard line before being brought down by Alan Hoover. Vernon Henderson then went through the Pasco line without a hand being laid on him for another Davis score. Mel Louk, Alan Hoover, and Clark Romans were the only ball players who seemed to want to play ball as about 80 per cent of the tackles that were made went to these three players.
