The Pasco Bulldogs played their final non-conference game Friday, January 2 and opened the 1960 hoop season with a 54-45 defeat to the Pendleton Buckaroos.

A sustained drive in the last quarter of the game, led by Jim Potter, enabled the Pendleton Bucks to build their margin from 36-33 at the start of the period to the final winning score. Potter scored 14 points in the last quarter as Pendleton potted nine baskets to Pasco's six. The first half of the game was very close, with never more than a three point difference in the score. The teams shared leading honors alternately until the second half when Pendleton scored five straight points, giving them a six point margin.

The Bulldogs, paced by guard Don Evans, tied the Buckaroos 40 all in the early part of the fourth period, before Potter, high scorer of the game, sparked his team to victory.

Potter nabbed 22 points in the game followed by Evans, with 17 points.

The Pasco Junior Varsity swamped the visiting Pendleton B squad 50-14 in a preliminary game at the Pasco High gym. Loran Larson received high game honors with 15 points. Three other Bulldog players hit the double-digits.

## Familiar P.H.S. Athletes



Two familiar faces participating in sports in the Pasco School District in past years are Randy Schultz and Jim Keane who are now considering college sports.

The Richland Bombers downed the inspired Pasco Bulldogs 51-43 in an exciting game Friday night. The Bulldogs led throughout most of the game but four quick buckets midway through the fourth quarter put Richland ahead to stay.

Don Evans and Jim Keane scored in the double figures to keep the Bulldogs in the game until the final minutes of the ballgame. A great and inspired team effort was used Friday night, in giving the Richland club a real score.

Clark Henderson and Ray Amstadt scored eight points a piece while Bob Mooney contributed one to round out the teams scoring.

In the preliminary game the Bullpups tripped Richland 62-44 with Jim Chubb and Bob Stromer scoring 16 points a piece to pave the way.

Winning by a margin of nine points, the Pasco Bulldogs thrashed their hosts the Cadets, of Eisenhower High in Yakima in a game played last Saturday night. The 46-37 upset saw a blazing second quar-

ter performance by the Pasco team, scoring some 23 points, led by high game man Don Evans with 20 personal points. Jim Keane followed with 10 points. This was the Bulldogs first league victory for the season.

Eisenhower led at the end of the first quarter 8-7, but the Bulldogs outscored the Cadets 30-18 at halftime.

Senior forward Clark Henderson suffered a leg injury in the first period, and was unable to play the remainder of the game.

Loran Larson with 14 points was high scorer in a preliminary B squad game with Eisenhower. Pasco won 48-43. So far this season the Pasco Junior Varsity team has racked up a brilliant 5-3 record, winning three conference games, dropping only one.
