Before World War I there was very little status seeking, right now there is a great amount of it.

4. We tend to make friends like ourselves. They are chosen by their background and family characteristics.

She also attended the Pacific Slope Press Conference in Seattle last year and plans to attend again this year.

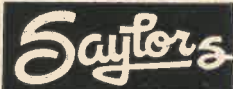

Waltzing away with scores of 38-6 and 59-0, the undefeated Pasco Bulldog wrestlers downed two hosting prep teams in mat action two weeks ago.

January 14, the Bulldog squad met the Walla Walla Blue Devils in the Wa-Hi gym and went on to win ten of the twelve matches, four of them by pins.

Previously undefeated Ron Thompson of Walla Walla was decisioned by 156 lb. Jim Yarnell in a grueling 5-2 battle.

Monte Morford wrestled Steve Gradwohl in one of the closest matches of the afternoon.

Ron Ross, wrestling in the 105 lb. class pinned Rod Jensen after 45 seconds of mat action.

Pasco won all of the exhibition matches.

Friday, Jan. 15, Coach Al Metcalf's wrestling team won its seventh straight win in a 59-0 match with the Pendleton Buckaroos.

The Bulldogs pinned ten of the Bucks, and decisioned three.

Pasco won all but one of the exhibition matches.

Grapplers Defeat Kennewick

Pasco led by Jerry Baker, Monte Morford, Don Story, Ron Ross, Randy Schultz, and Shelby Tate remained unbeaten among the few prep wrestling teams in the state.

Jerry Baker took his eighth victory, all by pins, by defeating Kennewick's strong sophomore, Odie Mansfield in 3:39.

Lloyd McCoy, Kennewick's unbeaten heavyweight who placed second in the wrestling tournament last year, pinned Ed Treibwasser to continue in the win column.

The win was Pasco's third in league competition while Kennewick has dropped two, both to Pasco.
