## P.H.S. Alumni Honored

Craig Jackson, last year's second semester ASB President, was one of four students from PHS who were placed in the "honors" English class at Washington State University in Pullman.

Others honored were Sue Moffett, Barbara Hubal and Pete Anderson.

Honors English courses are conducted chiefly for students who achieved a high rating on their entrance examinations. During the first semester they complete their freshman English course.

Only four to five per cent of the freshmen ever enroll in this special class.

The 121 freshmen who placed sufficiently high in entrance examinations will be classed as members of honors courses. Lewis and Clark of Spokane sent ten. Pasco tied with West Seattle for third place. Each sent four.

## Scholarship Information

Now is the time to get in touch with Miss Boothe or Mr. Metcalf concerning the scholarships available for high school students that plan to enter college.

Seniors, the deadline for most applications is February 1, 1960. It would be advisable to get your forms as soon as possible. Application forms that are in the office are Washington State University, Whitman College, University of Washington, College of Puget Sound, Gonzaga, Holy Names, University of Portland and Seattle University. Many other forms will be received in the office in the immediate future including Columbia Basin College. Continue to check in the office concerning these new forms.

Usually the scholarships cover tuition and fees. For instance, the average amount received by students to WSU last year was approximately \$200, to CBC it was \$135. Last year approximately 20 students earned scholarships to CBC in this amount.

In addition to scholarships there are loan programs to help cover the college expenses. The National Defense Loan is one type which is available to students enrolling in the field of education, science or engineering. See Miss Boothe or Mr. Metcalf in connection with any of these items.

## Bombers Win 4th Jamboree

The Richland Bombers from Columbia High School showed their strength once again at the Sixth Annual Tri-City Basketball Jamboree December 1. The dominating Bombers hit a total of 89 baskets in the 20 minute "game" compared to 60 for Kennewick, and 58 for the Pasco Bulldogs. On the point differential basis, Richland scored 45 plus points; the Kennewick Lions a minus 9, and Pasco with a minus 36 points.

An A and B team from each of the three Tri-City schools matched talents in six 10-minute quarters during the confab held at the Pasco High School gymnasium.

Opening action of the evening saw the Lions upset the Pasco Bulldogs 37-30, followed by a 39-23 game between Richland and Kennewick. The Bombers trounced the Bulldogs 50-21 in the final match of the jamboree.

High scorer of the game was **Dick Coffman** of Richland with 20 points, followed by **Jim Walton** and **Randy Free** from Kennewick with 15 and 13 points respectively. **Don Evans** was high man for the Pasco squad with 13 points, and **Gary Haun** of Kennewick scored 12.

## WA HI TRIPS BULLDOGS IN SEASON OPENER

The Walla Walla Blue Devils chalked up their second Tri-City victory Saturday by overpowering the Pasco Bulldogs 52-40, in a game played at Walla Walla.

The phenomenal shooting and skilled ball handling of the Walla Walla team made the difference. High scorer of the game was Pasco's **Clark Henderson**, who made 18 of the 40 points for the Bulldogs.

The Blue Devils dominated the game from the first basket, and led the struggling Bulldogs through the remainder of the game. At the end of the first period the Blue Devils led by four points and by half-time were out in front 31-20.

Walla Walla's close checking defenses halted the Bulldogs second half attempts to gain points. Pasco hit 10 of 16 free throws and Walla Walla hit 14 out of 22 shots.

The Bulldogs hit 34 per cent of their shots while Walla Walla took advantage of Pasco fumbles and bad passes.

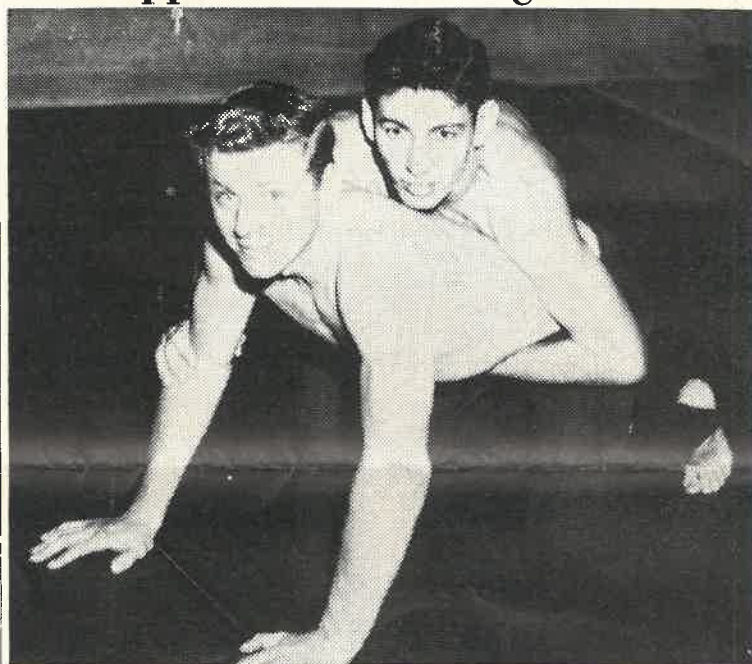

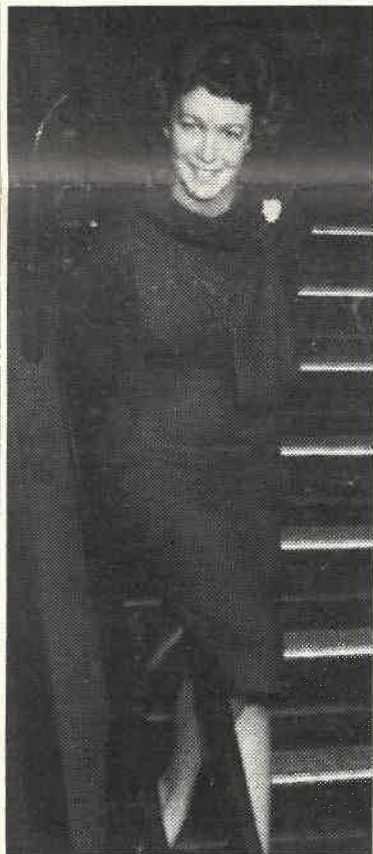
