Bartanen Conducts
Lecture Series

This past week the Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Advanced Biology classes were taught for a few days by a teacher from the Traveling Science Demonstration Lecture Program. Mr. Warren Bartanen and his associate, Mr. Robert Henrich took thirteen weeks of training last summer at the University of Oregon to prepare for visits to different high schools in the Northwest.

This program is supported by the National Science Foundation and is intended to benefit science and mathematics teaching methods in secondary schools by bringing to them the latest in scientific information, teaching techniques, instructional equipment and resource materials.

In his talks, Mr. Bartanen

used demonstrations, displays, and techniques in particular phases of science. His schedule was spread out through the entire week and he presented new approaches in specific areas of science which were related to class work.

Mr. Bartanen touched upon such subjects as: life in the past, geology, and radiation geology in the biology classes; modern physics and electronics in the physics classes; and atomic and molecular structure, reaction rates, ion exchange, colloidal chemistry and acids, bases, salts, and indicators in the chemistry classes.

Mr. Bartanen was formerly a teacher at Kennewick High School. Mr. Henrich a teacher at Columbia High in Richland.

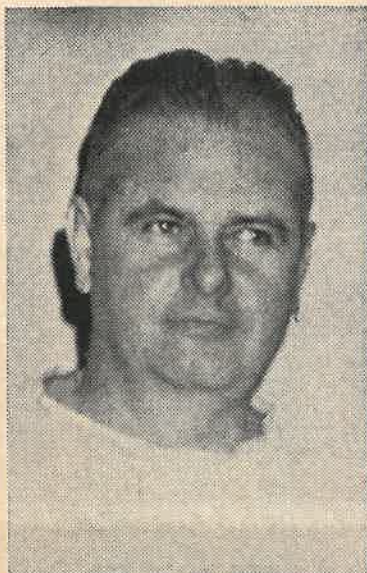
