Pasco Senior High has added eight new teachers to its faculty this year, and Wasco wishes to introduce them to the student body.

Mr. Keith Birkenfeld taught History, English, and Social Studies in Moses Lake High School last year. This year he is teaching U. S. Government and Current World Problems here in Pasco High. When asked what he thought of the school so far, he said, "I think the school spirit here is better than I've ever seen before. I am very pleased to see the student take such pride in their school and various activities. It's the only school, however, where I've found that the students are allowed to leave the grounds during the noon hour."

Mr. Bill Bode: Many of us are well-acquainted with Mr. Bode as last year he was director of Pasco's Junior High School Band. This year he has taken the Senior High Band under his instruction, and has been teaching the Pep Club girls their formations for marching. He also is teaching the Photography class.

Mr. Raymond Frey: Last year Mr. Frey substituted in the art classes of Oakland schools in California. This year he has taken on a full-time job with Pasco High's art classes. When asked his opinion of the school he said, "I like it very much."

Mr. Charles Hall taught French in Brigham Young University last year and has joined the faculty as a German teacher. When asked his opinion of the school so far, he responded, "I think there is good student-teacher relationship and this is impressive to me. I like the balance between the city and farm students also."

Mrs. Ruth Holman: This year typing students as well as shorthand students have found Mrs. Holman to be their instructor. Last year she taught in Zillah High. She had this to say of our school: "I am real thrilled and delighted to be here. The organization of this school is marvelous and the students are cooperative and well-behaved."

Mr. Hilbert Mantel comes to us from Richland's Columbia High School, and is instructing chemistry and biology classes. The Pasco Bulldogs came as close as they have all season to winning a game when they battled to a 20-20 tie with the Richland Bombers.

The Bombers, who led 13-0 in the first half, seemed as if they were going to dominate the score throughout the game. But the game Bulldogs battled back to tie the score, which eventually was the way the game ended.

Bobby Cleveland highlighted the evening's action by taking the Richland kickoff on the eight yard line and running the ball back for a 92-yard touchdown for Pasco. Richard Jimmerson, now an established sophomore, took a handoff from quarterback Mel Louk and broke away from would-be tacklers and proceeded 55 yards for another Pasco score. Mel Louk, the only senior quarterback for Pasco, ended the Pasco scoring with a one yard plunge over center.

Richlands speedy halfback, Jack Glover, was the first to break the ice for Richland in the first quarter by taking a pass from Doug Lukens and going all the way through the Pasco defenders. Craig Lansing made it 13-0 in favor of Richland with a quarterback roll-out for another six points. Bruce Smith ended the Richland scoring on a 20-yard touchdown pass from quarterback, Doug Lukens.

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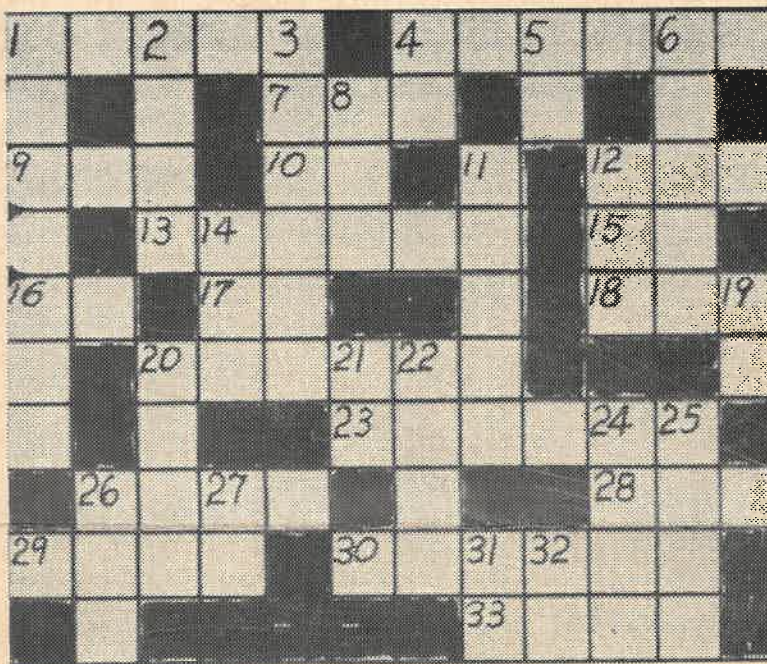
