Jamelyn Lisk Girls Of Month

Jamelyn Lisk, a P.H.S. senior, has been chosen Miss September, Girl of the Month, by the Girls' League secret committee.

Born in Nampa, Idaho, on June 18, 1943, Jamelyn transferred from Yakima in her sophomore year, and is presently serving as A.S.B. secretary, a member of the Senior Girls Trio, secretary of F.T.A. and co-editor of the Sinewash.

Last summer she travelled east with her family and while at Washington, D. C. toured the White House, the Capitol, and the Smithsonian Institute. In New York City, she viewed the Rockettes at Rockefeller Center.

Jamelyn also belongs to National Honor Society, and National Thespians, and during the summer she also attended Girls' State.

The Girl of the Month is chosen by a secret committee composed of different people each month. The committee consists of two senior girls, two junior girls, and two sophomore girls, a Girls' League officer and a member of the faculty.

All P.H.S. girls are eligible to become Girl of the Month, and are judged on the following points:

1. Working for, and loyalty to, Pasco High School.
2. Relationship with all girls in the school.
3. Representing our school to the community and to other schools.

F.H.A. officers will attend the Leadership Training School at East Valley High School in Yakima on October 6. Members of F.H.A. also served coffee and cake at the Washington State Home Economics Convention the week before school started.

Comedy, Drama, Featured In Four One-Act Plays

Four one-act plays will be presented by National Thespians on the evening of Oct. 11 at 8 p.m. in the High School auditorium.

The first of the four one-act plays is a stirring drama entitled "Fog On the Valley." The director is Linda Case, and her assistant is Jean Bishop.

The second play to be presented is a heart-warming comedy called "Mr. Vincent." Under the direction of Miles Jaeger and his assistant, Max Towne, the cast will enact the story of a young girl who is thoroughly interested in painting and little else. Her family urges her to date now and then, but their efforts are fruitless until the arrival of a certain Mr. Vincent.

Appearing in this play are Barbara Sickles (Penny), Steve Bowerman (Mr. Vincent), Tony Husk (Henry), Nancy Baldwin (Caroline), Jo Ann Smith (Susan), Linda Cooley (Cynthia) and Ed Leaverton as Ted. Prompters are Shirley Gross and Janice Gomsrud.

Following this light comedy comes a suspenseful drama, "High Window," directed by Jennifer Scott and her assistant, Dianne Bentson.

Walter Lodge (Larry Krueger), carefree and independent only a year ago, is now merely a pale and timid shell of his former self. His shrewd old Aunt Emily (Wanita Dunbar), taunts him cruelly about his weakness — and an awful secret they seem to share. In some way the imposing window is the center of the problem.

It takes a clever young newspaper woman (Marie Anderson), to solve the mystery of the high window. Other members of the cast are Ron Bracy as Judge Stephen Craig and Brianna Morgan as Linda Norton, Aunt Emily's secretary. Prompters are Rose Halverson and Kay Stampe.

The last play, "Last Night's Paper," brings the evening to a frolicking close.

Mr. Harris (Tom Webb), wants last night's paper for the market reports. Mrs. Harris (Brenda Moser), wants it to cut out a recipe. Anita (Penny Seaver) and Lenore (Kathy Shenefelt), both want it for school assignments. But nobody can find the paper because the boys, Casey Jones (Jan Peterson) and Bobbie Harris (Pete Lorain), have hidden it — after cutting out a "Lonely Hearts" ad.

Too shy to ask girls of their own acquaintance for dates, they plan to try a little experiment. Their discussion of what they like in girls, and their telephone conversations answering the ad are a riot. Mother, of course, straightens everything out. 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Ike Hi Tromps Bulldogs

Last year's 20-6 defeat at the hands of the Pasco Bulldogs was avenged Friday night as the Eisenhower Cadets, led by halfback Mack Graves, scored what seemed to be an easy victory over the Bulldogs. The Bulldog's lack of playing as a team and failure to block was the two main factors in Ike HI's win.

Junior quarterback Loren Larson did an excellent job in piloting the team even though they lost. Pasco backfield, the youngest in the conference, ran well until they hit the line and there wasn't a hole for them to go through.

Willis Orange, starting on defense at the line-backer spot, received exceptional praise from Coach Mayberry on the fine job that he did offensively and defensively.

The written figures show that both teams were equal in playing but Eisenhower just got the breaks.

Eisenhower gained 73 yards rushing to Pasco's 69. Ike had the edge in passing — 122 yards to Pasco's 71. However, 62 of them came in the final second of play when Mack Graves threw his 62-yard touchdown pass to Harvison

to end the final scoring. Robert Mooney, who is Pasco's biggest gainer and only returning backfield starter from last years team, suffered back and knee injuries in the game and his condition won't be known until later.

Sophomore Jim Cox, who has looked good at the end position, may see quite a bit more action as the season progresses. It was Cox who caught the 31-yard pass from Larson to set up Pasco's only touchdown. After a one yard pass to Hoover, Sophomore Richard Jimerson shot through right guard for the final four yards and Pasco's only touchdown.

b. Go down to your next class, sneak in when the teacher isn't looking, and tell him with wide-eyed innocence when he confronts you, that you were there all the time.

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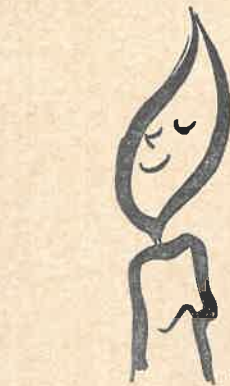
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
