

Open Container Policy Disputed

The open container policy has been a controversial subject since it was applied during the school year last year. Mr. Reynolds made the policy because of the massive littering in the halls and from sneaking alcohol into school with these containers. Students have found the excuse of possible alcohol violations a very poor one, since you can just as easily pour alcohol into a can as you would a cup. When Debbie Dupuy was asked how shr felt about the excuse of alcohol she stated, "It's very

contradictory. If people are going to get drunk they are going to find a way to avoid the system, and no open container policy can stop that."

Mr. Reynolds feels that the kids who used the open containers to get alcohol into class have been discouraged by not being able to use open containers. He also stated that it was much more difficult to pour alcohol into the opening of a can than it is an open container, and that will help to stop the problem.

Alcohol has not been the major problem with open containers, nor


boast of your victory.

I hope someone can take this problem and get change. Sincerely, Roman Morales





White House Race: Students Voice Their Opinions


The following are the results of a poll answered by approximately one-half of the senior class at P.H.S.


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

Students Flex Their Mental Muscle

Pasco High, along with its Football, Basketball, Volleyball, and other athletic teams, also has another team you may or may not have heard about. The team members don't do calesthenics, push ups, or laps around the track, and they rarely draw blood from the opposing team. What they do is called the Knowledge Bowl.

Their first meet will be held in Connell on October 25. The teams that they will most likely be playing against in our region this year are Hanford, Connell, and Kiona Benton. For some reason, over the past few years Kennewick High and Richland High have failed to produce teams. The top two

teams at Regionals will go to State, which will be held in Vancouver, Washington, this April.

This motley crew of sixteen sophomores, juniors, and seniors divided itself into four teams with names such as "The Coneheads," "Vuarnet," and "The Trojans". Each has his or her own reason for joining Knowledge Bowl. One team member, Dawn Krupke, said, "Well, I heard about it last year through Mrs. Foreman, and it sounded like fun." Others had more sophisticated and well thought out answers, like Ryan Bagley who said, "The reason I joined was to miss four days of school!"

Looking over these four teams is their

fearless leader, your librarian, Mrs. Foreman. She has been coaching Knowledge Bowl participants for four years. When asked about her coaching strategy, she said, "You can't really prepare or study for something like this, either you know the answers or you don't." There are no official practices, although some of the teams meet weekly or bi-weekly to get a feel for the game.

Each meet consists of four rounds. The first is a written round, and the other three are oral rounds. After each round, the scores are tallied. In the next round, the top three scorers compete against each other,

the next three square off against each other, and so on down the line. After all four rounds are completed, the top scorer is declared the winner.

In the written round, each team is given a list of 60 questions. They are given 45 minutes to answer as many as they can.

In each oral round, a question is read to a group of three teams, and each gets a chance to answer the question in the order that they hit their "buzzer bars". The team captain is the only one allowed to talk with the person asking the questions. A point is awarded for each correct answer, and there is no penalty for wrong answers.

Selective Service

What is Selective Service? For those of you who don't know, Selective Service is a list of names of registered men which can be called up in a time of emergency, saving our government many weeks in mobilizing the necessary manpower.

When you turn 18, if you are a guy, you must register with Selective Service within a month of your birthday. All you have to do is go to the local post office and fill out a card with the necessary information, give it to the clerk and show some ID.

It is important that 3 key points are understood by the men at PHS.


1. Registration with Selective Service is not only a legal requirement, it is also a prequisite for obtaining federal student

loans, job training benefits, and federal employment.

2. Registration is not a draft. There has not been a draft since 1973. Registration simply provides our country with a list of names that could save 6 weeks in augmenting our volunteer forces, should congress ever declare a national emergency.

3. Registering is easy and takes about 5 minutes. Young men need only fill out a card at the post office.

Should I go to college? If so, where should I go? What should I major in? Will I live on or off campus? Should I go right after I graduate, or wait a year?

Many questions run through the minds of seniors who are considering a college education. But the biggest question of all is......How am I going to pay for it?

Over the years the cost of a college education has discouraged a countless number of high school graduates from furthering their education. This high expense has also forced many students to attend small or community colleges rather than the large prestigious universities.

However, many college officials have stated that the cost of college should never be the determining factor in deciding whether or not you should attend college. Even the most expensive colleges have what is called FINANCIAL AID avaliable to students.

Financial Aid is a program used to help students meet college costs. And while college costs are at an all-time high, Financial Aid is in high demand. Although there isn't enough aid for everyone, help is provided to a large percentage of the applicants. In 1987, aid was granted to 5 million students and the amount avaliable is expected to increase to \$21 billion this year.

Currently there are 3 types of Financial

Aid avaliable to students: Grants or Scholarships, Loans, and Work.

\$3235

Grants or Scholarships

These are funds that do not have to be payed back. Grants are normally based on need, while scholarships are awarded to students that excell in some area.

Loans

\$5620

College loans must be repaid. Usually there are lower interest rates than commercial loans, and they can be paid back following graduation.

Work

This involves earning money from a job that is usually arranged by the college.

The mistake many students make is the failure to realize that Financial Aid doesn't just happen to people. You have to MAKE it happen! In order to do this you have to know how to make it happen. Usually this merely requires the simple procedure of filling out a Financial Aid Form (FAF). However, you can receive details on Financial Aid in the Guidance Office. They have several useful pamphlets concerning Financial Aid avaliable to students.

The bottom line is that there is Financial Aid avaliable to everyone. "So don't be left out. Don't rule it out. Check it out!!"

With the annual rise in college tuition it becomes difficult for many qualified students to attend college. Scholarships become very attractive with the extra boost finacially they provide. Students, in order to receive the many scholarships available, need to know how to correctly fill out all the scholarship forms they are qualified for.

To begin with a student should apply for only the scholarships they qualify for. What is the point of spending the time of filling a form when it will immediately be rejected? If a student isn't sure about a particular scholarship, they should visit the guidance office where complete listings of all scholarships are posted.

When filling out a scholarship it is wise to type out the form or print neatly. A scholarship reviewer will not take the time to read disordely forms that are full of errors. Most scholarships ask for essays or letters of recommendation in a effort to see what your character is like. Most teachers at Pasco High will write letters on the condition that you fill out a self-evaluation packet. These can be picked up in the guidance office and ask for information such as awards or extra-cullicular activities. If the scholarship asks for an essay, make sure someone else proofreads it.

Students should be aggressive when filling out scholarships and not procrastinate. Many scholarships go unfilled every year because no one applied. Students who are aggressive usually receive more scholarships even though they may not be the most qualified. Even though most scholarships are small in monetary terms, they quickly add up and help in a big way. Mrs. Frare advises perspective students to check with the guidance office regulary or check with the WASCO, which displays a column in this issue that posts all available scholarships.


high school essay that a lot of us slap together the night before it is due. Rather, to be of high quality this is an essay that will require months of preparation.

In this month's Wasco we've decided to highlight two members of the team. They are seniors Norma Peralta and Rosa Peralta.


Norma is seventeen and has been playing soccer for twelve years. When she was

The team works very hard and continues to dominate the Tri-City area.

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
