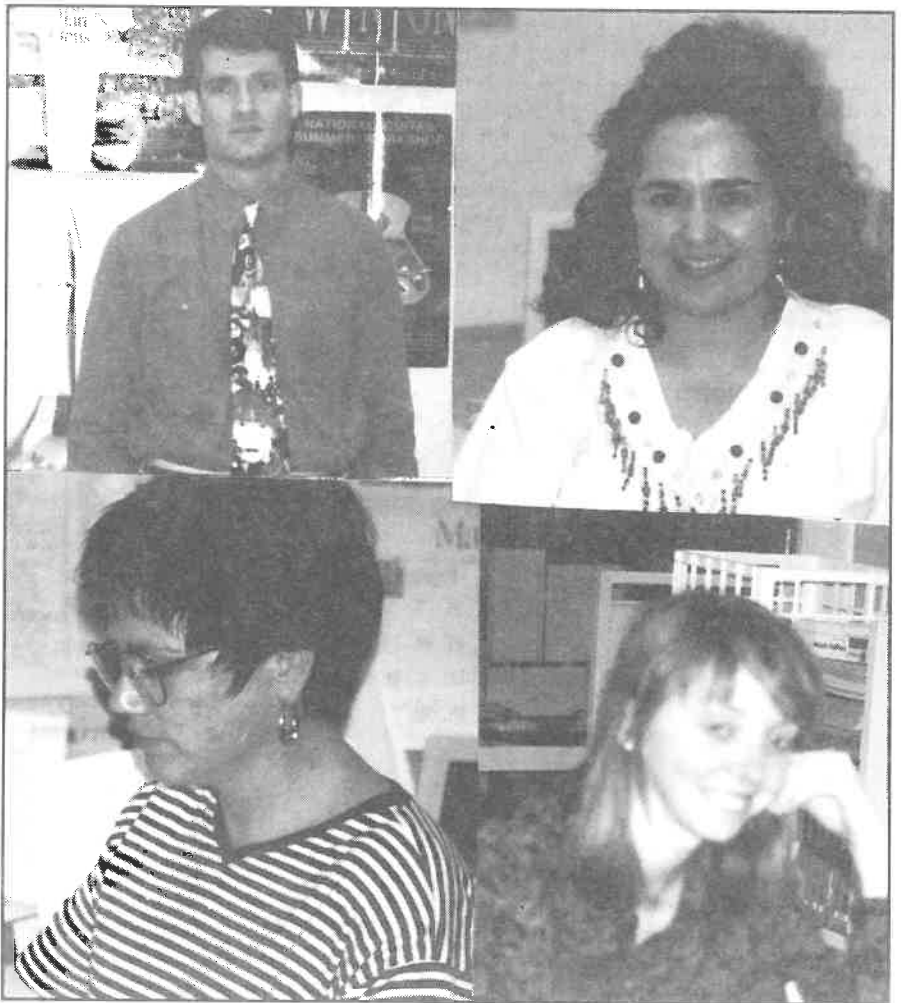

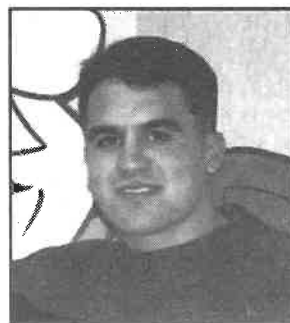

April Caldwell- will be majoring in business at WSU this coming fall. Some of her activities include-



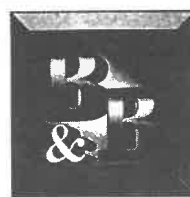

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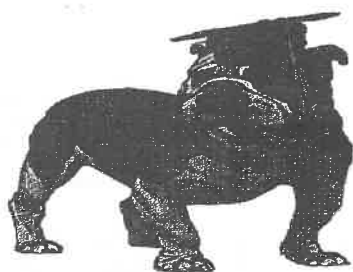
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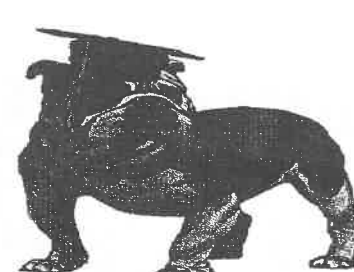
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Senior Predictions

The natural witch of course does not agree with the things that the other three witches are doing, so she tries to quit the circle. But the other girls get very upset and try to

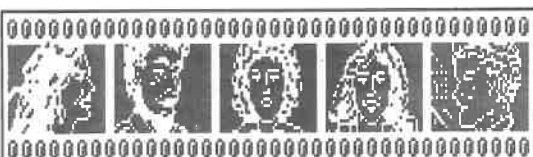

kill her, yes try to kill her by magic. The cool thing is that they can not do that because she is a natural witch and her powers are stronger then all theirs put together.

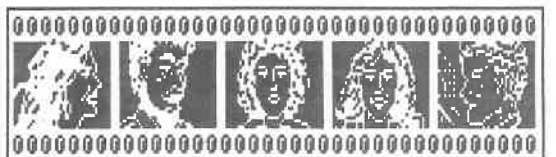
In the end they all have a big blow out and two of the three girls lose their powers and one of the girls go insane and gets enrolled in a mental hospital.

A high-tech, highly odd CBC experience

Director J. Kevin Doolen has brought new ideas and new plays to the CBC drama department. His first show "Lonely Planet" was a huge success that was recognized as an outstanding regional play by the Kennedy Center/American College Theater Festival, but his most recent show, a combination of two one act plays was, well, odd.

"Applicant" and "Interview" were performed in the CBC theatre on May ninth through the twelfth. Because they were both one-act plays they were shown without intermission, and the set was cleared by a brigade of "Robo-Techies," stage hands dressed in white plastic suits with their faces made up in white make-up. The entire theatre was an extension to the set. There was a chain link fence wrapped

around the back of all the seats; the top of which was covered with snaking barbed wire. The house lights, instead of the regular yellow or white, were an angry red, and the music that was pumped throughout the theatre was, instead of the usual elevator-style music, a futuristic electronic style.

The set itself was designed to look high tech...and impersonal, and it had the neat feature of an elevator type thing that could have come straight out of Star Trek. It was very spartan because of the space the actors needed for their movement, but it did create the effect of seeming detached and impersonal.

The first one-act was "Applicant" about a man applying for a job at a huge corporation. He is subjected to an odd assortment of test and shock therapy treatments by his in-

terviewer, the only two characters. It was by far the lesser of the two plays. It tried to convey the idea of technology and large corporations taking over peoples lives with no

regard to their well-being. It was supposed to make the audience think, and I guess it did; I thought it was dumb. It complemented the following one-act well, it just wasn't very effective.

"Interview" was a far better play. It was about four people who are looking for work at various places including the unemployment offices. It shows you much of their character through glimpses at their lives and experiences. Because of the way it was staged the actors were forced to give very athletic performances with dancing and running a major part of the play.

It had funny moments and serious moments. It likened a job interview to a dance with the applicants and the interviewers waltzing and tangoing across the stage. One of the most memorable moments

was when one of the applicants, played by Brent Harvey, was at a psychiatrists office seeking help, and the psychiatrists advice was, "Blah, blah, blah, blah, hostile. Blah, blah, blah, blah, penis. Blah, blah, blah, blah, mother. Blah, blah, blah, blah, Money." This was repeated several times and escalated into a conga line up the stairs that travel through the audience. I also enjoyed the plays picture of politician that shows a gubernatorial candidate greeting the public with lies and false promises. It ended with the rest of the cast, portraying a crowd, in anger. They walked into the audience and shouted in your face as you sat there.

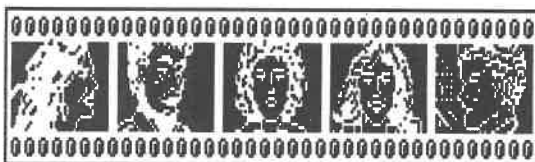
Jazz Choir visits Mt. Hood

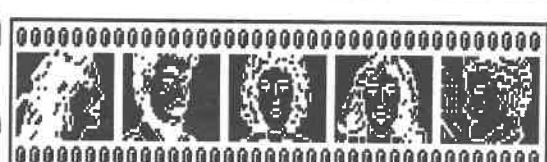

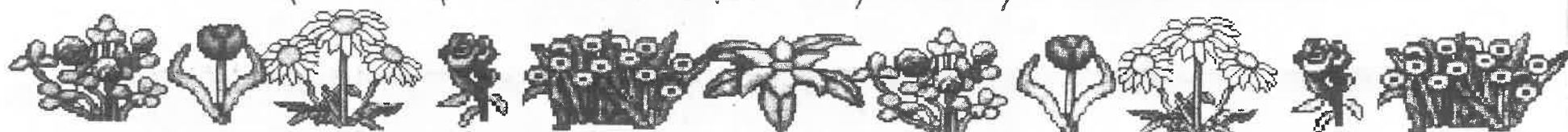
"I thought they did a super job", said Mr. Fine of the Steel Magnolias play cast. He continued, "It's a tough play with lots of lines and emotions."

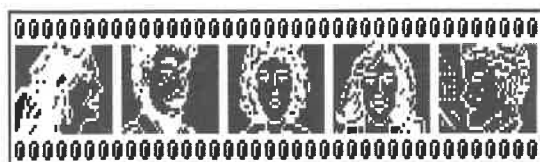

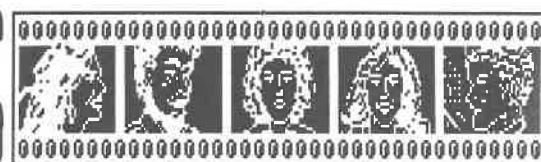

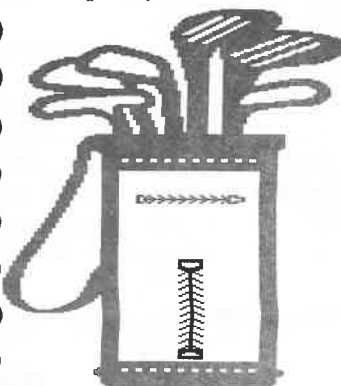

field when practice gets a little dull.

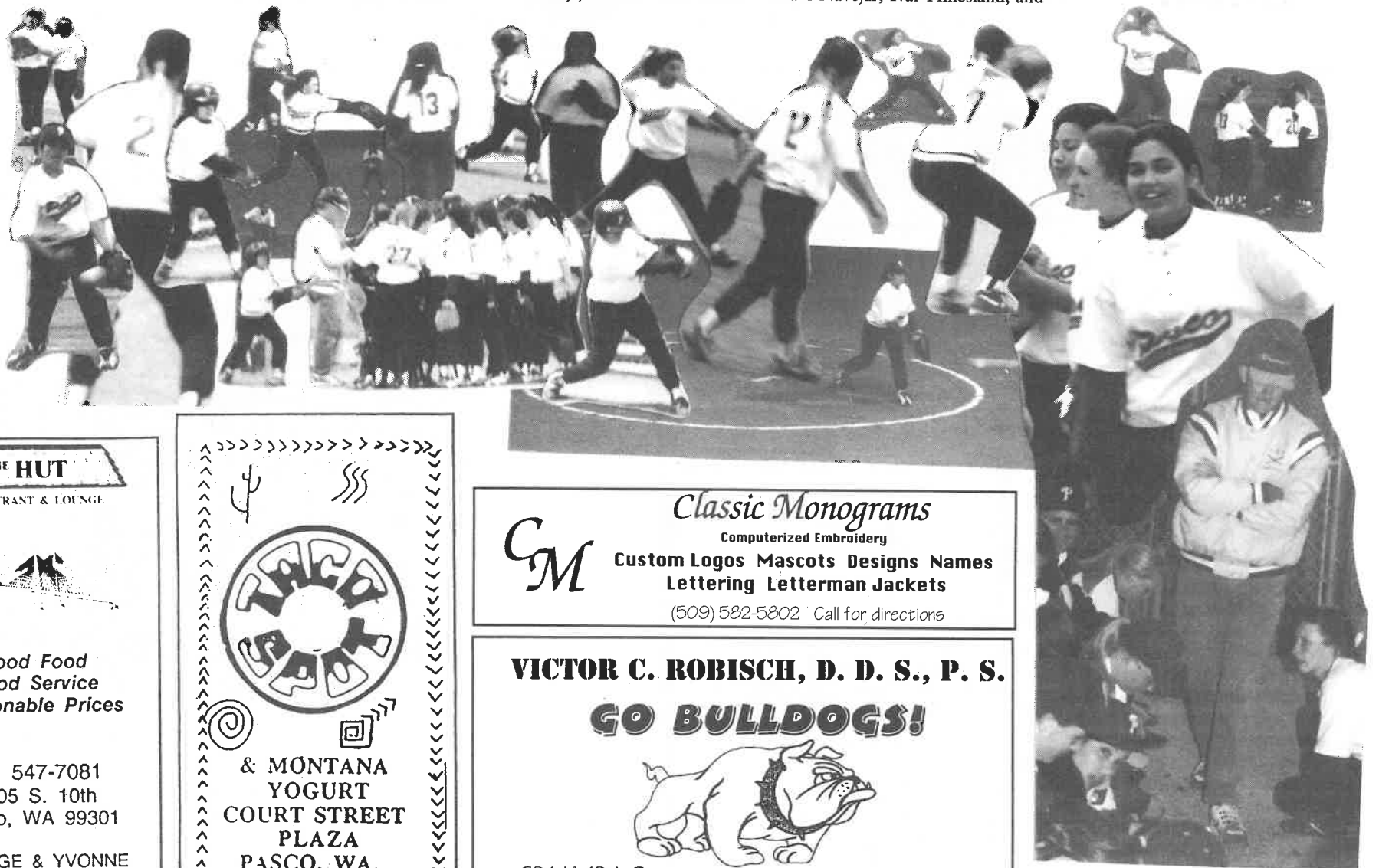

Best of luck Lady Bulldogs! Whatever happens at Regionals and hopefully State according to Anna Dinh, "It's been a great season."



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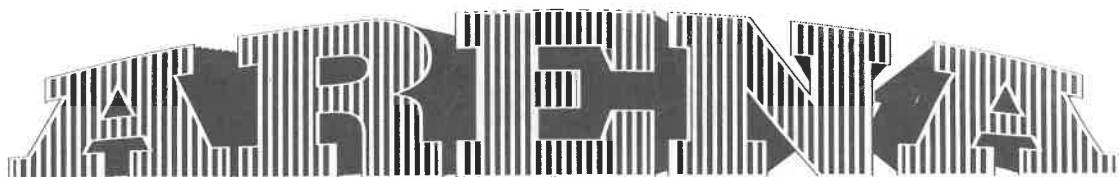

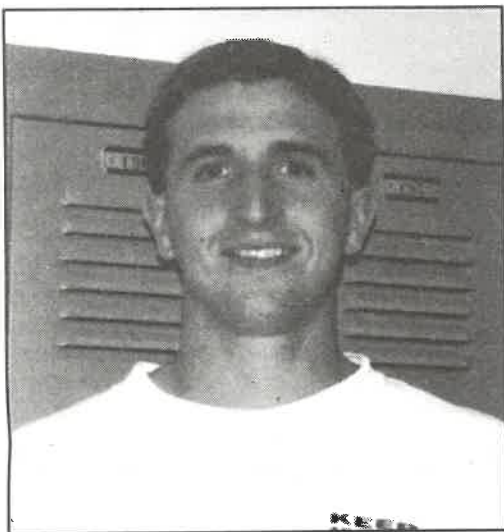
was a team leader by example. He worked hard everyday in practice and always had a good attitude.
