AP exams are a huge focus for AP students. They are the chance to be rewarded for all the hard work by possibly receiving college credit if you do well. These tests are graded on a scale of 5 points. 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3rd Party Mediators

Five years ago, the Pasco school district hired professional mediators to train Pasco school district employees and 12 students to

mediate. So what is mediating anyway? Well, it means to intervene and counsel someone or some persons who have a major conflict.

The first students trained were all 6th graders from either McLoughlin and Stevens and they in turn trained other students the following year.

Trained mediators at Pasco High make up a group of people called Third Party. They meet with and advise troubled students before they have a physical fight or some other type of blowout.

Not just anybody can be a mediator, according to Mrs. Rossbolt, the advisor of Third Party.

"We want kids who look out for others, who recognize actions that are unfair to their peers," she said. "They aren't all kids with perfect records, we want kids of all backgrounds and experiences."

Each year, more students are trained in two day, 12-hour training sessions that involve intense, emotional instruction and preparation. There are about 25 peer mediators at Pasco High.

Mrs. Rossbolt also explained how the students run the organization by themselves. They decide when and how often to hold meetings and what fundraising they want to do.

"Mediating shows that students can solve their own problems without adults," said Third Party member and senior Mario Miranda. "It's students helping other students."

Members of Third Party stay in the organization until they graduate, so once you're in, you're in.

To be in Third Party, you must be recommended by a teacher, school staff member or a peer mediator. If you are interested in becoming a member, talk to Mrs. Rossbolt or any peer mediator.

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VETERANS DAY- MEMORY MANY WOULD LIKE TO FORGET

Could you imagine being 22 years old, and running through an open field getting shot at, risking your own life for your country? One of our own PHS teachers had that awful experience. Mr. Bickenhauser served in Vietnam, as an army sergeant, in the mountain region with 5th Special Forces (Aitborne) in 1970-1971. He served both in combat and in medical work. He worked with the Humog and Juari tribes, which were "Indians of South Asia." Mr. Bickenhauser himself, delivered a total of thirty-seven Vietnamese babies.

He remembers combat as being "violent, quick, and noisy." As anyone can imagine, your scared to death the whole time your in combat, wondering what is going to happen next. Bickenhauser said that you had to constantly think. If you didn't think then you would die. He lost six good friends in combat.

Do you think you could go two or three days without a chance to sleep? That's just what you had to do during the war. You were always on the move, and it was tough trying to find time to sleep.

Mr. Bickenhauser remembers receiving letters from his loved ones, but he said he didn't take them with him into combat because they weren't allowed to take personal belongings with them onto the field. He also remembers the letters that came off the bodies of the enemies with pictures of their families. "Those pictures still haunt me."

When he got back from the war he said he "had the personality of a brick." It took him fifteen years to "fit in with people." Before the Desert Storm War, it wasn't okay to be a Veteran, so he stayed close to his family and other Veterans. He read everything he could get his hands on.

When asked "Why he felt the war cause so much turmoil in America?" he responded with "I think any war causes turmoil. It was the first war that people could actually watch on television, and the myth of war was stripped away." The sad reality was after the war, Civilians blamed the Veterans themselves, the ones who were dragged into the war to fight, instead of blaming the politicians and businesses, who caused the war.

The personal good that came out of the war was the concept that Mr. Bickenhauser developed. "Life is wonderful and valuable. I know that I'm alive everyday, and that life is good."

The main reason that Mr. Bickenhauser became a teacher "was to teach well enough so that people could learn peace before they learn war."

Veteran's Day never brings back good memories for those Veterans who had to suffer through the Vietnam War. Mr. Bickenhauser likes to spend the day by himself, until he goes home where his wife has cooked him a fantastic dinner. He thinks that businesses should close on Veterans Day, and he doesn't like the "Veterans Day Sales," because he feels it "cheapens the holiday."

Veterans spent many long days and nights in war scared for their lives, and missing their families back in America. We are very grateful for what these Veterans did. They have many interesting and horrifying stories to tell, many of which are very exciting, and make you appreciate that you haven't had to go through anything like it. So if you know anyone who is a Veteran, take the time one day and ask them about it, you might be surprised on what you will find out.

Many measures are being taken to reverse childhood involvement in gangs in the schools. But suspension and a slap on the hand are not enough. If we are going to solve the problem of gangs in the community, action must be taken in the home. It is important to take the time to help the kids, their futures depend on it.

Travis Treefallonhead: When I press the emergency brake gatorade fills my mouth, but I don't like lime flavored.

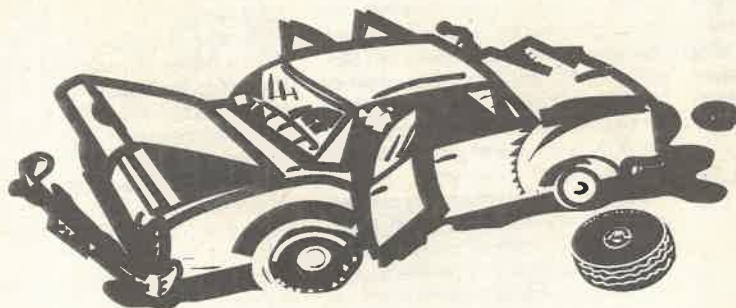
Popcorn-Ear-Face: When I honk

Is Sixteen Too Young to Drive?

On your 21st birthday you can legally drink, and on your 18th birthday you can vote and are considered an adult. But one of your most anticipated birthdays is probably your 16th. When you're 16, you are eligible to get a license to drive. No more driver's ed, no more permit restrictions, and no more parents in the passenger seat. You have freedom at last. But the question has been raised: "Is 16 old enough to drive?"

16-year-olds just receiving their licenses have 3-times the crash rate of 17-year-olds, 5 times that of 18-year-olds, and 15 times the rate of 20-24-year-olds. Because of these statistics, a form of graduated licensing has been adopted by several states. Policy makers concluded that it isn't skill, but lack of maturity and experience that determines these statistics of newly licensed drivers.

Difficult driving tests don't seem to solve anything. For example, Sweden requires a 2-hour multiple choice test, 2-hour driving test through city and highway traffic, and the renowned "Swedish Slippery Test". This is a 2-hour test of speed and panic stops on an icy or oil-soaked surface. Despite this, 15,000 15-24-year-olds die in traffic accidents every year.

The graduated licensing consists of 3 stages: learner's permit, intermediate license, and full license. In order to move on in the levels, you must deal with restrictions on driving hours and a clear record. The learner's permit is just like the one in effect now. However, after passing the written and driving tests, instead of getting a full license, you get the intermediate license. This means you can only drive from 5am to 10pm. For 1 year, you must maintain a record clear of crashes or alcohol-related

problems. After this, the driver must take an additional knowledge and on-road test to get a full license.

Many states have accepted this or other forms of graduated licensing. The results were encouraging and Maryland has reported a 5% decrease in crashes and a 10% reduction in traffic convictions for 16-17-year-olds. This type of restriction on licenses is not an unrealistic possibility in the near future. It's easy to say that many if not all teens are unhappy about this prospect. As you get more involved with school, sports, and other activities, driving comes in handy. (Not only for students, but also for parents.) Ignoring the crash rate is most likely more of a trouble than having a graduated form of licensing. Do teens really lack the responsibility? Maybe the threat of a restriction on their freedom will bring them around.
