Ordinary People wasn't a bad play and the Drama department did a good job on a difficult production.

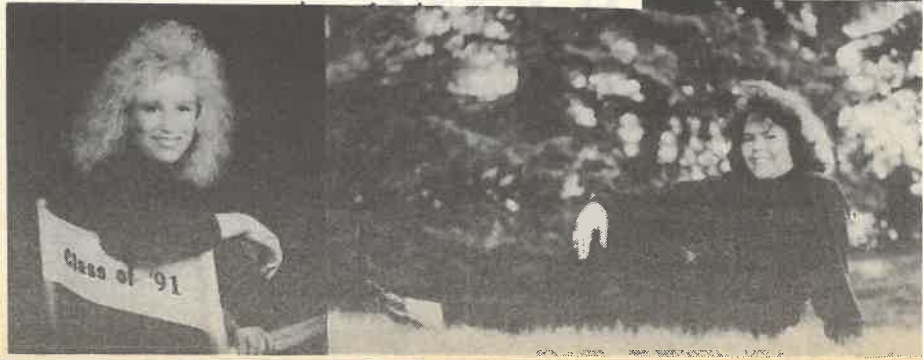

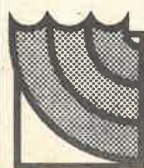
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"One Good Cop" - One Great Time

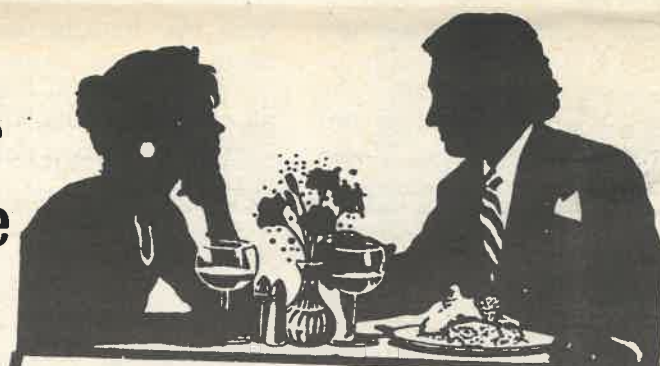
